

Why we love this subject

- German is phonetic and is relatively easy for English speakers to pronounce.
- German is logical; Once you have understood the basics and you've got the grammar and the layout of the language, it is not too tricky for English speakers to learn.
- Learning how to interact with speakers of another language means you are less likely to be stuck in one mode of thinking; it makes you more adaptable, creative, and insightful.
- Speaking German changes the way you think.





Why we love this subject

The German-speaking world is wunderschön!

German is the most commonly spoken language in Europe with over 100 million native speakers, it is the second most commonly used scientific language in academia.

Germany itself is an economic powerhouse and is the 2nd largest exporter of goods in the world.

Germany's economy is the largest in the EU and is larger than the economies of all the Spanish-speaking countries combined.

















Why we love this subject

We love the **sound** and the **structure** of German and the fact that is it a logical, clearly structured language.

The language is **quirky** and also strangely poetic with words that cannot be translated in other languages and **compound nouns**, where words are joined together to make new words.

Learning a language is a very **sociable** thing to do as well as giving you a real sense of achievement.

Being able to communicate in another language gives you access to **double the culture**; music, film, art, sport, TV

- Opinions and topics will be more in-depth and evidence-based.
- Spontaneity and authenticity will be more prominent features of speaking activities.
- Writing will take more varied forms (e.g. summaries, essay writing) and will be more analytical and critical in focus, using a range of lexis and structure.
- The chance to research an aspect of German-speaking society and culture that interests you.






