To kick off the term Macbeth was brought to Redhill by the National Production Company!

Courtesy of our fabulous English department students from our Year 10 & 11 cohorts stepped into the 11th century and witnessed the captivating tale of Macbeth brought to life by the talented performers of the National Production Company. The production aimed to engage our older students currently completing their exams in Drama and English literature.

After the main production students had the opportunity to interact with the cast helping deepen their understanding and gain alternative perspectives while exploring the plot, themes and values within this timeless classic.

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CREST is the British Science Association's scheme for STEM project work that inspires young people to think and behave like scientists and engineers.

For the CREST Bronze Awards this year, our Year 8 team has been tasked with thinking up an original idea based around a Scientific enquiry that they are passionate about.

These students were challenged to plan and design, in detail, a practical experiment (and build a prototype, if necessary) to help answer their chosen Scientific question.

They researched suitable materials that they would need to test their hypothesis using their design (and prototype, if applicable).

They explored the Science behind their design, justifying their choice of materials and demonstrating a high level of organisation while working/collaborating with other students.

This years project is scheduled for a 10 hour completion time and they are currently in the 4th hour and working hard on their research.

WHAT IS CREST?

The CREST Bronze Award is a perfect introduction to STEM project work for young people aged 11+.

Over the course of 10 hours, teams of students design their own investigation and record their findings, giving them a taste of what it is like to be a scientist or engineer in the realworld.

The Bronze level works well in a STEM club setting or as something that is completed across a term, although there is no deadline for completion.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT YEAR 7 SCIENCE

SCIENCE CLUB

This term we have been engaged in a series of fun practical activities such as Bath Bomb making, Fire Writing, Messy Volcanoes and making Alien Blood!

We have seen wonderful uptake from students this term with over 70% of our club regularly attending!

Bath Bomb Recipe

(ensure you supervise children at all times)

- 1 cup baking soda
- 1/2 cup of citric acid
- 1/2 cup cornstarch
- 2 tsp. essential oil of your choice
- 2 tbsp. carrier oil (coconut oil or sweet almond oil)
- A few drops of liquid food colouring
- Moulds (ice cube tray, toy packaging, yogurt pots)

Step 1: Pour baking soda, citric acid & cornstarch into a bowl and whisk the ingredients until fully combined.
Step 2: pour the essential oil, carrier oil and food colouring into the other bowl and mix the ingredients together until the food colouring is fully incorporated.
Step 3: Slowly pour the oil mixture (from step 2) into the dry ingredients (from step 1). When the oil is all in, keep whisking and add drops of water in between.
Step 4: Leave your bath bombs in their moulds for 2-4 hours before removal. Now you're ready to admire your new creations as they fizz away in the bath!

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT ZACH HAYNES


This term we had the pleasure of adding Zach Haynes to the ranks of our Redhill Legends after he became the Cadets Male Advanced British Taekwondo Champion!
