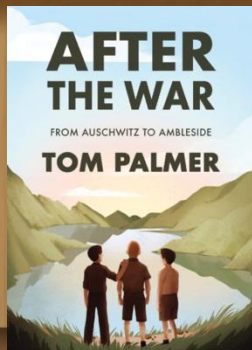


Ghost by Jason Reynolds

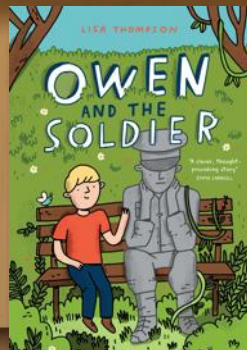
